RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF UTICA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY TAKING OFFICIAL ACTION TOWARD THE ISSUANCE OF TAXABLE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BONDS IN AN AMOUNT SUFFICIENT TO FINANCE CERTAIN COSTS OF THE 1002 OSWEGO STREET LLC FACILITY, OR, IN THE ALTERNATIVE, IN CONNECTION WITH LEASEBACK OR LEASE-LEASEBACK TRANSACTION FOR SUCH FACILITY, APPOINTING 1002 OSWEGO STREET LLC AND/OR AN ENTITY FORMED OR TO BE FORMED ON ITS BEHALF AS AGENT OF THE ISSUER FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING, RENOVATING AND EQUIPPING THE FACILITY, AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN INDUCEMENT AGREEMENT.

WHEREAS, 1002 Oswego Street LLC, on behalf of itself and/or the principals of 1002 Oswego Street LLC, and/or an entity formed or to be formed on behalf of any of the foregoing (collectively, the "Company") has applied to the City of Utica Industrial Development Agency (the "Issuer") to enter into a transaction in which the Issuer will assist in the acquisition of a 7.00± acre parcel of vacant land formerly known as the Bossert Site located at 1002 Oswego Street, City of Utica, Oneida County, New York (the "Land"); the construction on the Land of a 45,600± square foot commercial building and a convenience store to be constructed in the future on a 2± acre outparcel (collectively, the "Improvements") and the acquisition and installation of machinery and equipment in the Improvements (the "Equipment") (the Land, the Improvements and the Equipment referred to collectively as the "Facility") all for the purpose of the distribution of automotive parts and lubricants, corporate headquarters for United Auto Supply and providing a retail convenience store, including, without limitation, the following as they relate to the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of such Facility. whether or not any materials or supplies described below are incorporated into or become an integral part of such Facility: (i) all purchases, leases, rentals and other uses of tools, machinery and equipment in connection with the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping, and (ii) purchases, rentals, uses or consumption of supplies, materials and services of every kind and description used in connection with the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping and (iii) all purchases, leases, rentals and uses of equipment, machinery, and other tangible personal property (including installation costs with respect thereto), installed or placed in, upon or under such building; and

WHEREAS, the Company will convey to the Issuer a leasehold interest in the Facility; and

WHEREAS, the Facility will be leased to the Company or such other person as may be designated by the Company and agreed upon by the Issuer, pursuant to Article 18-A of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York and Chapter 710 of the Laws of 1981 of the State of New York, as may be amended from time to time (collectively, the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, The Company will sublease a portion of the Facility to United Auto Supply of Syracuse West, Inc. ("UAS") for its operation; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the Improvements will be further subleased by the Company to other commercial tenants (together with UAS sometimes referred to individually as a "Sublessee" and collectively as the "Sublessees"); and

WHEREAS, the Act authorizes and empowers the Issuer to promote, develop, encourage and assist projects such as the Facility and to advance the job opportunities, health, general prosperity and economic welfare of the people of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the issuance of the Bonds, if any, the Issuer contemplates that it will provide financial assistance to the Company in the form of issuance of a lease for a term of ten (10) years, abatement of real property taxes for a period of ten (10) years, exemptions from sales and use taxes and exemptions from mortgage recording taxes, which benefits represent a deviation from the Issuer's Uniform Tax Exemption Policy, to be more particularly described in a Final Authorizing Resolution to be adopted by the Issuer prior to the closing of the transactions described herein; and

WHEREAS, prior to the issuance of the Bonds, or, in the alternative, prior to the closing of a sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction, and the granting of any tax benefits, a public hearing (the "Hearing") will be held so that all persons with views in favor of or opposed to either the financial assistance contemplated by the Issuer, or the location or nature of the Facility, can be heard; and

WHEREAS, notice of the Hearing will be given prior to the issuance of the Bonds, or, in the alternative, prior to the closing of a sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction, and the granting of any tax benefits, and such notice (together with proof of publication) will be substantially in the form annexed hereto as **Exhibit A**; and

WHEREAS, the minutes of the Hearing are or will be annexed hereto as $\underline{\textbf{Exhibit}}$ $\underline{\textbf{B}}$; and

WHEREAS, the Issuer has given due consideration to the application of the Company and to representations by the Company that the proposed issuance of Bonds or, in the alternative, the proposed sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction, is either an inducement to the Company to maintain and expand the Facility in the County or is necessary to maintain the competitive position of the Company in its industry.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City of Utica Industrial Development Agency (a majority of the members thereof affirmatively concurring) that:

- Section 1. (a) The acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Facility and the financing thereof by the Issuer, through the issuance of industrial development revenue bonds pursuant to the Act, or, in the alternative, the sale or lease of the Facility to the Company by the Issuer pursuant to a sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction, will promote job opportunities, health, general prosperity and the economic welfare of the inhabitants of the County and the people of the State of New York and improve their standard of living, and thereby serve the public purposes of the Act and the same is, therefore, approved;
 - (b) It is desirable and in the public interest for the Issuer to issue the Bonds, or in the alternative, to enter into a sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction, for the purpose of financing the costs of the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Facility, together with necessary incidental expenses in connection therewith as reflected in the Company's application to the Issuer and as amended from time to time prior to the issuance of the Bonds or, in the alternative, prior to the closing of the sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction.

Section 2.

The form and substance of a proposed inducement agreement (in substantially the form presented to this meeting) by and between the Issuer and the Company setting forth the undertakings of the Issuer and the Company with respect to the issuance of the Bonds, or, in the alternative, the closing of the sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction, and the development of the Facility (the "Agreement") are hereby approved. The Chairman of the Issuer is hereby authorized, on behalf of the Issuer, to execute and deliver the Agreement, with such changes in terms and form as the Chairman shall approve. The execution thereof by the Chairman shall constitute conclusive evidence of such approval.

Section 3.

Subject to the conditions set forth in Section 4.02 of the Agreement, the Issuer shall (i) if Bonds are issued, issue the Bonds in an amount and with maturities, an interest rate, redemption terms and other terms and provisions to be determined by a further resolution of the Issuer, (ii) acquire, construct, renovate and equip the Facility, (iii) lease (with an obligation to purchase) or sell the Facility to the Company pursuant to an agreement by and between the issuer and the Company whereby the Company will be obligated, among other things, to make payments to or for the account of the Issuer in amounts and at times so that such payments will be adequate to pay the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds, (iv) if Bonds are issued, secure the Bonds in such manner as the Issuer, the Company and the Purchaser(s) of the Bonds mutually deem appropriate. proceeds of the sale of the Bonds, if Bonds are issued, are insufficient to finance completion of the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Facility, the Issuer will, subject to the terms of the Agreement, and upon the request of the Company, take such actions and execute such documents as may be necessary to effect the issuance from time to time of additional bonds, whether on a parity with the Bonds or otherwise, for the purpose of paying the costs of completing the Facility.

Section 4.

The Company is herewith and hereby appointed the agent of Issuer to acquire, construct, renovate, equip and complete the Facility. The Company is hereby empowered to delegate its status as agent of the Issuer to agents, subagents, contractors, subcontractors. materialmen, suppliers, vendors and such other parties as the Company may choose in order to acquire, construct, renovate, equip and complete the Facility. The terms and conditions for the appointment of the Company as agent of the Issuer for the purposes described in this resolution are set forth in the form of the attached letter addressed to the Company, marked as Exhibit C to this resolution. The form of such letter is incorporated herein by reference and is approved and adopted by the Issuer, and the Chairman or Executive Director of the Issuer or any other duly authorized official of the Issuer are authorized to execute and deliver such letter to the Company. The Issuer hereby appoints the agents, subagents, contractors, subcontractors, materialmen, vendors and suppliers of the Company as agents of the Issuer solely for purposes of making sales or leases of goods, services, and supplies to the Facility, and any such transaction between any agent, subagent, contractor, subcontractor, materialmen, vendor or supplier, and the Company, as agent of the Issuer shall be deemed to be on behalf of the Issuer and for the benefit of the Facility. The Company shall indemnify the Issuer with respect to any transaction of any kind between and among the agents, subagents, contractors, subcontractors, materialmen, vendors and/or suppliers and the Company, as agent of the Issuer.

Section 6.

The law firm of Bond, Schoeneck & King, PLLC is appointed Bond Counsel and Issuer Counsel in connection with the issuance of the Bonds, or, in the alternative, Transaction Counsel in connection with the sale-leaseback or lease-leaseback transaction.

Section 7.

Counsel to the Issuer and Bond Counsel are hereby authorized to work with counsel to the Company and others to prepare, for submission to the Issuer, all documents necessary to effect the authorization, issuance and sale of the Bonds, if any.

Section 8.

The Chairman of the Issuer is hereby authorized and directed (i) to distribute copies of this resolution to the Company, and (ii) to do such further things or perform such acts as may be necessary or convenient to implement the provisions of this resolution.

Section 9.

This resolution shall take effect immediately.

Oswego Street, LLC, on behalf of itself and/or the principals of 1002 Oswego Street, LLC and/or an entity formed or to be formed on behalf of any of the foregoing (collectively, the "Company") has applied to the Issuer to enter into a transaction in which the Issuer will assist in the acquisition of a 7.00± acre parcel of vacant land formerly known as the Bossert Site located at 1002 Oswego Street, City of Utica, Oneida County, New York (the "Land"); the construction on the Land of a 45,600± square foot commercial building and a convenience store to be constructed in the future on a 2± acre outparcel (collectively, the "Improvements") and the acquisition and installation of machinery and equipment in the Improvements (the "Equipment") (the Land, the Improvements and the Equipment referred to collectively as the "Facility") all for the purpose of the distribution of automotive parts and lubricants, corporate headquarters for United Auto Supply and providing a retail convenience store. The Facility will be initially owned, operated and/or managed by the Company. The Company will sublease a portion of the Facility to United Auto Supply of Syracuse West, Inc., and other portions of the Facility may be subleased to other commercial tenants.

The Issuer will acquire a leasehold interest in the Facility from the Company and leaseback the Facility to the Company for its operation. At the end of the lease term, the Issuer will terminate its leasehold interest. The Issuer contemplates it will provide financial assistance to the Company in the form of the issuance of a lease for ten (10) years, abatement of real property taxes for a period of ten (10) years, exemptions from sales and use taxes and exemptions from mortgage recording taxes, which benefits represent a deviation from the Issuer's Uniform Tax Exemption Policy.

A representative of the Issuer will at the above-stated time and place hear and accept written comments from all persons with views in favor of or opposed to either the proposed financial assistance to the Company or the location or nature of the Facility. A copy of the Application for Financial Assistance filed by the Company with the Issuer, including an analysis of the costs and benefits of the proposed Facility, is available for public inspection at the offices of the Issuer, One Kennedy Plaza, Utica, New York.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF UTICA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY ADOPTING A NEGATIVE DECLARATION FOR THE PURPOSES OF SEQRA RELATING TO THE 1002 OSWEGO STREET, LLC FACILITY.

WHEREAS, 1002 Oswego Street, LLC, on behalf of itself and/or the principals of 1002 Oswego Street, LLC and/or an entity formed or to be formed on behalf of any of the foregoing (collectively, the "Company") has applied to the City of Utica Industrial Development Agency (the "Agency") to enter into a transaction in which the Agency will assist in the (a) acquisition of a 7.00± acre parcel of vacant land formerly known as the Bossert Site located at 1002 Oswego Street, City of Utica, Oneida County, New York (the "Land"); (b) construction on the Land of a 20,000± square foot mixed-use commercial and retail building (the "Commercial Improvements") and acquisition and installation of machinery and equipment in the Commercial Improvements (the "Commercial Equipment") all for the purpose of the distribution of automotive parts and lubricants and providing a regional headquarters for United Auto Supply (the Commercial Improvements and the Commercial Equipment collectively, the "Commercial Facility"); and (c) construction on a 2.00± acre out-parcel on the Land a commercial/retail structure (the "Retail Improvements") and acquisition and installation of machinery and equipment in the Retail Improvements (the "Retail Equipment") all for providing a retail convenience store or other equivalent retail/commercial use (the Retail Improvements and the Retail Equipment collectively, the "Retail Facility"); and

WHEREAS, the Commercial Improvements and the Retail Improvements are sometimes referred to collectively as the "Improvements" and the Commercial Equipment and the Retail Equipment are sometimes referred to collectively as the "Equipment" and the Land, the Commercial Facility and the Retail Facility are sometimes referred to collectively as the "Facility;" and

WHEREAS, the Agency by resolution duly adopted on April 17, 2012 (the "Resolution") decided to proceed under the provisions of the Act to lease the Facility and directed that a public hearing be held so that all persons with views in favor of or opposed to either the financial assistance contemplated by the Agency, or the location or nature of the Facility, could be heard; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, Chapter 43-B of the Consolidated Laws of New York, as amended (the "SEQR Act")

and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto by the Department of Environmental Conservation of the State of New York, being 6 NYCRR Part 617, as amended (the "Regulations"), the Agency desires to determine whether the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Facility may have a "significant effect on the environment" (as said quoted term is defined in the SEQR Act and the Regulations) and therefore require the preparation of an environmental impact statement; and

WHEREAS, to aid the Agency in determining whether the acquisition, construction and equipping of the Facility may have a significant effect upon the environment, the Company has prepared and submitted to the Agency a long environmental assessment form (the "EAF"), a copy of which was presented to and reviewed by the Agency at this meeting and copies of which are on file at the office of the Agency; and

WHEREAS, the Agency has examined the EAF in order to make a determination as to the potential environmental significance of the Facility; and

WHEREAS, the City of Utica Planning Board (the "Lead Agency"), based upon the EAF and other representations and information furnished by the Company regarding the Facility, determined on May 21, 2012, that the action relating to the acquisition, construction, equipping and operation of the Facility is a "Type I Action" (as defined in the Regulations) and will not have a "significant effect" on the environment; and

WHEREAS, based on the Agency's review of the Application, the EAF and the resolution of the Lead Agency, the Facility appears to constitute a Type I Action.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CITY OF UTICA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Based on an examination of the Application, the EAF, and the resolution of the Lead Agency, and based further upon the Agency's knowledge of the area surrounding the Facility and such further investigation of the Facility and its environmental effects as the Agency has deemed appropriate, the Agency makes the following findings and determinations with respect to the Facility:

(A) The Facility is described in the Application, the EAF and the Lead Agency resolution and the supporting documentation attached thereto;

- (B) The Facility constitutes a "Type I Action" (as defined in the Regulations);
- (C) No potentially significant impacts on the environment are noted in either the EAF for the Facility, and none are known to the Agency;
- (D) The Facility will not result in (i) substantial adverse change in existing air quality; ground or surface water quality or quantity, traffic or noise levels; a substantial increase in solid waste production; or a substantial increase in potential for erosion, flooding, leaching or drainage problems; (ii) the removal or destruction of large quantities of vegetation or fauna; substantial interference with the movement of a resident or migratory fish or wildlife species; impacts on a significant habitat area; substantial adverse impacts on threatened or endangered species of animal or plant, or the habitat of such species; or (iii) other significant adverse impacts to natural resources;
- (E) The Facility will not affect a critical environmental area as designated pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.14(g);
- (F) The Facility will not conflict with the community's current plans or goals as officially approved or adopted;
- (G) The Facility will not result in the impairment of the character or quality of important historical, archeological, architectural, or aesthetic resources or of existing community or neighborhood character;
- (H) The Facility will not result in a major change in the use of either the quantity or type of energy;
- (I) The Facility will not result in the creation of a hazard to human health;
- (J) The Facility will not result in a substantial change in the use, or intensity of use, of land including architectural, open space or recreational resources, or in its capacity to support existing uses;
- (K) The Facility will not result in encouraging or attracting of a large number of people to a place or places for more than a few days, compared to the number of people who would come to such place absent the action;

- (L) The Facility will not result in the creation of a material demand for other actions that would result in one or more of the above consequences;
- (M) The Facility will not result in changes in two or more elements of the environment, no one of which has a significant impact on the environment, but when considered together result in a substantial adverse impact on the environment; and
- (N) The Facility will not result in two or more related actions undertaken, funded or approved by an agency, none of which has or would have a significant impact on the environment, but when considered cumulatively would meet one or more of the criteria in 6 NYCRR Section 617.7(c).
- Section 2. The Agency hereby determines that the Facility will not have a significant impact on the environment and the Agency will not require the preparation of an environmental impact statement with respect to the Facility. As a result, the Agency has prepared a negative declaration with respect to the Facility.
- Section 3. The Executive Director of the Agency is hereby directed to file in the Agency's records a negative declaration with respect to the Facility (said negative declaration to be substantially in the form and substantially to the effect of the negative declaration attached hereto).

Section 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.
